**6<sup>th</sup> Grade Girls Basketball Team Wins Big 10 Tournament**



**AT A SPECIAL** meeting of the Village Board on Monday, April 6th, action was taken to move a Developers Agreement forward to the regular scheduled board meeting on April 14th. This Developers Agreement encapsulates the details of the development, as well as, the tax incremental financing support that will be provided to the development at 601 N. Sherman Avenue. This is one of the final steps as this project moves toward implementation.

The current plan is for the land acquisition to be completed on or around April 16th. Notices to current tenants to vacate in 90 days will then be given. Toward the end of July, the existing structures will be razed and construction of the new building will begin. A parallel project with this development will be the undergrounding of power lines along the Commercial Avenue corridor and on N. Sherman Avenue, from Commercial Avenue to approximately where the apartment building is located.

Next topic, if I can ask you to do anything, it's to please talk with your family about the drug epidemic of heroin spreading across our communities. Many places are seeing the consequences of heroin use in Madison, as well as, the towns, cities and villages nearby, including Maple Bluff.

The Maple Bluff Police Department has had numerous incidents and interactions with persons affected by addictions to heroin. In one case, on Easter Sunday afternoon, a heroin addicted young man in his mid-20s, along with his 22-year-old female friend serving as his driver, who is also addicted to Heroin, tried to rob the Vic Pierce Liquor store. When the attempt to rob the store failed, the young man took his 7 inch knife and stabbed the face of the delivery driver at the Great China Restaurant. That attempted robbery also failed because the driver had no cash. Because of a helpful witness to this incident, and an immediate report to police, we were able to take both suspects into custody as they left the area. Both have been charged with attempted armed robbery.

In another recent case, a driver failed to execute a 90 degree turn on Del Mar in the village and the driver drove over a street sign, through a bush and onto a patio, just missing a home. The driver was arrested for driving while intoxicated and blood tests are pending for the level of controlled substances that she admitted to taking before driving. In another case in the nearby Town of Madison, a young female college student who started using



heroin to help her study now finds herself addicted. Our police officer went to help her on a medical assistance call when she could not be awoken by her family. When she woke up, she was combative with everyone, including EMS and police. There are even more examples of incidents in the community. It is evident we are being impacted by heroin use.

Heroin is so highly addictive and use of the drug is happening across demographic groups. This includes teenagers who may have no intent to move into using the harder drugs, like heroin, but it happens. For instance, they may be intoxicated at a party and use the drug while their inhibitions and judgment is clouded by alcohol. All it takes is one person to bring out the harder, more addictive drugs for the problem to begin. Or, maybe they try it intentionally, but either way it is the same result: addiction.

I know these are not glamorous topics to discuss, but prepare your family. Talk about making smart decisions. Remember, the best way to stop is to never start. We will keep helping these situations the best we can, but everyone needs to start becoming more aware of this problem. Consider yourself aware.

## 2015 Revaluation

Assessors in the Village Beginning May 4<sup>th</sup>

**THE VILLAGE OF** Maple Bluff is partnered with Associated Appraisal Consultants as its municipal assessment firm. Associated Appraisal has recommended a village wide revaluation. The purpose of the revaluation is to establish new assessed values, based on current market conditions, for all properties as of January 1, 2015.

Associated Appraisal staff will visit all properties in the Village of Maple Bluff. In order to make accurate assessments, appraisers will conduct an interior and exterior review of all homes, apartments and businesses. A brief interior walk through is necessary to consider features, quality and condition of each residence or structure. These factors can significantly impact market value. The appraisers will take exterior photos of your property. The appraisers have no interest in your housekeeping or personal belongings.

Associated Appraisal staff will carry a letter of introduction from the Village of Maple Bluff, a photo ID and will drive red vehicles displaying the Associated Appraisal company name. If no one is home when the appraisers visit a property, a door hanger will be placed on the main entrance with instructions on how to schedule an interior review. Your courtesy and cooperation is greatly appreciated when appraisers are visiting your property.

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**WE ARE HEADING** into arguably the best time of the year. The green up and blooming that takes place in the spring never fails to impress after the winter has had its way for what seems like half the calendar year. This spring will be busy for all of us as we deal with the usual landscaping and gardening chores. We will be monitoring the disturbed areas from the 2014 project, for it is likely that additional attention will be required for things to green up or some tire tracks need to be smoothed. Please realize that these areas will be impressive until the grasses really take hold that will likely take most of the spring and into the summer.

If you have an interest in volunteering with the village with the numerous gardens, we have many openings to showcase your talents. Please give us a call if you have a desire to assist.

We have started the process for a spring water system flushing. The first activity we do is to lightly flow water from every hydrant (one at a time). Then we will start over with gating some of the water main isolation valves and perform a directional flushing of the system with a more aggressive flow from specific hydrants to allow for clearing longer stretches of the water system. With this approach, I feel that the system is less likely to distribute discolored water.

As a reminder, just as we look for and correct issues with Maple Bluff's water system, you as a homeowner are responsible for maintaining your homes' plumbing. Protecting vulnerable pipes that are subjected to freezing temperatures is high on the list. Did you remember to remove and store all of your garden hoses? Drain and block out irrigation systems? Are there faucets dripping or toilets running? How about the water softener operation? There are

a few homes with boiler systems on a keep fill water supply, is it working properly? If any of these mentioned devices fail in your absence or go unrecognized and not corrected in a timely fashion, the corresponding water/sewer bill will be a real eye opener. We are not plumbers in Public Works, but we have witnessed all of these issues mentioned above, and we are willing to discuss any of your concerns.

We have recently performed some preventative cleaning of sanitary sewer lines. We target a cleaning and televising of 15-20% of the system annually. The village is responsible for the main lines of the sewer system; as a homeowner you are responsible for your lateral that connects to the main line. This lateral should receive some level of maintenance largely based on your historical experience with your system. A reputable service provide that is equipped to clean and clear all obstructions along with televising can provide you will solutions and a good maintenance schedule to fit your needs.

This is my favorite time of the year as we begin our tree planting around the village. By the time this newsletter reaches your mailboxes, several new trees will have already been planted. Unfortunately, we have had to remove several trees this spring due to hazard or health conditions; the public's safety always comes first.

There are several pet waste stations in the village now for the convenience of pet owners while walking your dog. The stations are **NOT** for yard pet wastes. Please place pet waste from your yards in your regular trash.
