I used to think that spring and summer were the busiest times around the Village. But the last couple years, there seems to have not been much of a lull during the late fall and winter months. As I think about this further, my guess is that over the past few years, we have been busy entertaining and contemplating development proposals and planning projects. If you haven't noticed, the Village has been in a perpetual state of planning with various projects taking place the last few years. These are not small projects either. Just think about everything that has happened the last 5+ years.

- 2 significant road projects (2010 & 2015)
- creating a Tax Increment District (TID)
- a development proposal (including PUD, GDP, SIP and TIF) for 601 N Sherman which is now under construction
- we are considering our 3rd development proposal for Roxbury/Sherman
- the Warren Dailey Cabin planning, fundraising, and construction
- the MBCC fundraising, construction and lease re-write
- Parks Committee CORP (Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan) process along with their current planning for park renovations
- MBCC entrance, new Tennis Courts and Roxbury crossing
- and finally, the Veterans Memorial Project which is still ongoing.

All of those projects on top of our daily, weekly, monthly and yearly activities! Wow. Simply, "Wow".

Within the next 30 days, we should know if the current development proposal for the Roxbury/Sherman intersection will proceed. This proposal has 27 condo style units in 3



different buildings. Of all of the proposals thus far, the feedback on this project is the most positive from neighbors and community members. However, the economic feasibility is the most vulnerable. Please stay alert for Village emails on meeting dates. If you have questions or comments, you can always reach me at the Village Center.

On the lighter side: When I started with Maple Bluff just a few short 15 years ago, my son Adam was a mere 3 years old and my younger son Mitchell would not be born for another 4 months. This month on June 5th, Adam will graduate from H.S. In my office I still have a picture (above) taken by Elizabeth Erickson of my family attending the Fest on the 4th parade so many years ago. This summer, Adam will help protect and care for your children or grandchildren at Arts & Athletics at the Village Beach. Help Build Our Veteran's Memorial By: Jim Schuler, Village President

A few weeks ago, Deputy Clerk Rene Dopkins dug out some old Village directories from the early 40's and saw on the back cover a list of Maple Bluff residents serving in World War II.

Most of them had not been included in the list of names to be commemorated on the Veteran's Memorial planned for Johnson Park. But everyone agrees they should. Virtually all of them were from our founding families.

It's hard to imagine how much their absences were felt by their families and the rest of Maple Bluff, much less the pride the entire Village shared. Maple Bluff was much smaller then—according to the 1940 census, we had only 862 residents, versus over 1300 now. That means that when those directories were published, almost 20% of the Village was defending our country and way of life.

So though those veterans may not have immediate family still living in the Bluff or aware of the Veteran's Memorial, they do have us. We know how much they and their families sacrificed. We still benefit today from the sense of community that inspired them to formally establish—and defend—our hometown. And we all owe it to them to do what we can to make sure the Veteran's Memorial is built and their legacies honored for generations to come.

Veterans Memorial Committee "SIT REP"

For you veterans out there, you will recognize this as a Situation Report. Of course you likely remember "Hurry up and wait" and "Do not volunteer for anything". At any rate, we thought a "Sit Rep" might be in order. As many of you know, a volunteer committee made up of neighbors who felt strongly that a memorial honoring Maple Bluff veterans was a worthy endeavor, have been, well, *endeavoring* to make it a reality. Such an effort comes with numerous challenges like; who will be honored, where will it be built, what will it look like, what will it cost, and most importantly how will it be paid for. It was the goal of this committee to provide some definitive ideas to address these challenges.

Who will be honored: All known Village veterans, current and past, who have served in the armed forces of the United States of America.

Where will the memorial be placed: A thorough evaluation of available Village communal lands was completed with the most desirable and logical choice being Johnson Park. Within Johnson Park, the knoll northwesterly of the Gazebo was selected as the memorial site.

What will the memorial look like: After numerous meetings and ideas, it determined that we needed professional assistance with the memorial design. Pechmann Memorials, Inc. was selected from three firms to help with final design. The design, as pictured on page 4, is the result of over a year's evolution of concepts.

The memorial as depicted is 42 ft wide, 30 ft front to back, wall portion is 3 ft wide and 5 ft high and about 18 inches below grade. Memorial footprint is 1,250 square feet plus walkway from Lakewood Blvd.

What will the memorial cost: Our current construction estimates are at approximately \$150,000.

How will it be funded: Funding will be provided by Village residents, veterans families, and other interested parties. Concept is that completed memorial will be donated to the Village, so ultimately the Village would be responsible for maintenance, but no Village funds would be utilized for construction purposes. All donations would be tax deductible.

Fly in the ointment: Like many military operations, things don't always go as planned. Since inception of this project, we have been compiling a list of Village veterans that would be honored on the memorial wall. That list was at 191 names in mid-April. The memorial was sized to accommodate 250 veterans. During



this period, Village staff uncovered some phone books from the World War II era. On the back of these phone books were listed Village residents serving in the war effort. This information added an additional 90 names that were not previously accounted for, putting our total count at 288 veterans.

Field Expedience: Another term veterans will recognize or as some might say, "get it done with what ya got". The committee met with Pechmann Memorial Tuesday, May 17th and with some modification of information to be included (basically dropping military rank) and perhaps resizing granite panels, they felt we could include the additional veterans without increasing the size or the cost of the memorial significantly.

The Veterans Memorial is scheduled to be dedicated on July 4, 2017, but the Veterans Committee needs your help in funding this great project. As of writing this article for the June publication, the Village has received \$30,000 in funds for this project. While any and all donations will be accepted, there are a few incentives to encourage donations aside from being tax-deductible. A \$250 or \$1,500 donation can include the purchase of a brick or stone etched with your name or a saying installed along the walking path to the Memorial. Major donors categorized in the following amounts: \$50,000 and above, \$25,000-\$50,000, \$10,000-\$25,000 will be recognized on a bronze plaque at the walkway entrance of the memorial. In case you are not aware, donations can be made via checks (made payable to Maple Bluff) or via Credit Card (processing fees apply).

Finally, it was decided to add a link on the Village's website to provide information on the Memorial project and current list of veterans. Information will also be made available at the numerous community events throughout the summer.

Public Works Staff Hard at Work

We are finally getting into some consistently mild weather after a very teasing spring that probably caused more than a few heartaches with killing frost. Aside from the loss of a few plants that could not handle the cold, this spring has been good for getting chores done. I have never been a fan of accelerating from winter to summer without the benefit of a real spring. This one has been just about perfect.

The Marina and Beach Park piers are in. The weather was a little cooler than you'd like for a day at the shoreline, even cooler for the guy in the water with a slight leak in the waders. The installation went well without much drama or fanfair, at least there was no need for revisions.

On May 7th we celebrated Arbor Day/Tree City along with Bird City/Earth Day at Johnson Park. Kids had an opportunity to enjoy various activities and hands-on projects supplied by Paul Noeldner, who was unable to attend this year. However, we were fortunate to have MB recreation staff person Samantha Knutson, who was assisted by Veronica Uribe, overseeing the Bird City/Earth Day activities.

We did manage to plant a sugar maple in the park with the assistance of Paul Elliott; Josh Popanz and Richard Garner. While these guys supplied much of the brawn, there were several young people supplying a great deal of



energy to get that tree nestled into its new home. I would like to thank everyone who attended and participated, Great Job!

That was just one tree. This year's order has been 22, could there be more? Possibly! A quick run-down of the trees purchased is as follows: 8 maples (3 varieties); 2 serviceberries; 2 pears; 3 eastern redbuds (tree form); 2 honey locust trees; 2 coffee trees; 2 white oaks. A large number of the trees were planted in Johnson Park, 7 so far, for there were a similar number of ash trees removed earlier this spring from Johnson Park.

The work will continue on the ash trees, primarily removal, some will be treated. Assessment will be made on condition; vigor; structure; damage or rot, etc. Treatment should only be provided to an ash that is in excellent condition and worthy of the process. Currently the only ash trees we are treating are white ash. I have seen too many issues with the far more prevalent green ash, and would prefer to continue with a replacement program that is variety rich, so as to avoid this type of plague in the future.

Please avoid over-mulching your private trees or village terrace trees. It is vital to the tree's livelihood to be protected from errant mowers and weed whips; so mulching is important. Too much mulch can be deadly, and it is a slow death to be sure, similar to planting a tree too deep. The root flare is the part of the tree that transitions from above-ground exposed to air bark, to the below ground root system. When you stack the mulch up the trunk of the tree, moisture will slowly rot the bark, eventually killing the tree. The same can be said for placing too much mulch around the tree. There is no limit on how far you can place mulch, the more the better, just not so thick that the ground and root system can't breathe. There are service providers that will diligently provide you 4" of mulch every year, year after year!! Can you imagine what is taking place? You are slowly burying your trees. Mulch is good, mulch for color, but do not have more than 2-3" of mulch present. If you have to have new, pull the old off and away before the new is placed. Your trees will thank you.


