Before starting this article, I looked back at my January 2016 article and read what I wrote about a year ago. It is interesting in that some of my article was about my personal life and family changes we were about to encounter in 2016 as my son Adam graduated H.S. and prepared to move out of state for College and my younger son Mitch also started some new endeavors. It all happened. Just as I wrote about a year ago. That includes the worries and the fears. But ya know what? It turned out just fine! Adam is now home for Christmas break with his first semester under his belt. His younger brother Mitch has had quite a year of new experiences as well and the worries I had then and still live now, are indeed present, but manageable. But I think that is how life goes. I believe in the awesome power of time. Time goes by so quickly, but as it passes, it increases our clarity, vision and understanding of our own life course, but in retrospect. I am just glad I did not write about the Presidential Election!

What about the Village in 2017? There could be much of the same from the start of 2016. Last year at this time, we were about to face a vote on a development proposal for the Roxbury/N Sherman Ave property. We are in a similar position this year though we don't really have a proposal anywhere near the table. I am hopeful that a Developer steps forward soon with a proposal. The Village will continue with our

planning for the N Sherman Avenue gateway. You should look forward to a meeting very soon to review some ideas about that corridor.

We will be holding our Village Caucus on Tuesday January 10th starting at 7pm in the Village Center Gym. Last year, five candidates were nominated and we had a vote off for Village Trustee. This year, we will again have three Trustee positions up for nomination, as well as, the Village President position. If you are interested in any of these positions, you can contact the Village Office for additional information.

Also in 2017, there will be several significant activities taking place. The first will be the fundraising effort of a Committee of Village Residents who are raising funds for the Veterans Memorial in Johnson Park. Next, the Parks Committee has a planning group who will be looking at some structural and remodeling updates to the Beach House. Finally, don't forget about the All City Swim (ACS) meet that will be hosted by the Maple Bluff Country Club at the end of July. The dates for that event are July 27-30, 2017. Although the MBCC is the host site, this is a significant event within our Village. Everyone will be affected in some way during this event. We will continue the planning process with the MBCC but anticipate more details being distributed as spring approaches.

In regards to other predictions for 2017, I can't really say that I have insider knowledge about what the future holds. But Time will tell I guess!!

Looking Forward Through 2017 By: Jim Schuler, Village President

One of the most fulfilling things about serving as a Village trustee is our ability, as a small municipality, to get things done. The state and federal government may experience gridlock, but even when our projects don't get approved, they get to a yes/no decision point fairly quickly. I hope in 2017 we can get to a "yes" point for developing the lots on the corner of Roxbury and Sherman.

We don't have any proposals in front of us yet, but if and when we get the next one, we'll have a more robust process with which to consider it. Since the Joe McCormick proposal failed a year ago, we've established the TID Advisory Committee, developed better tools for evaluating new projects both politically and financially, are updating the Gateway Plan to include the entire Tax Incremental Districts, and have made a commitment to include even more opportunities for residents to help us find a project that improves all our property values

(while also, hopefully, defraying our residential property taxes through a generous tax increment).

In the meantime, stay involved and don't be afraid to ask any of us what's going on. While we have a healthy rumor mill in the Village, they're easy to confirm with a call or email to me, any other trustee, committee chair or Village staff.

Also take a look at the TID Scorecard (there's a link to it on our homepage at www.villageofmaplebluff.com). The TID Advisory Committee did a great job of creating a tool that helps each of us weigh and discuss the pros and cons of any project. And please stay tuned for public meetings regarding the new, updated Gateway Plan. By working together, we're getting closer to making our stretch of Sherman Avenue a "main street" we can all be proud of.



K9 Program

Happy New Year!

It has been one year since the Maple Bluff Police Department was approved to start fundraising for a K9 program. Thanks to the approval of the Village board and generous donations from

Village residents we made this outstanding proposal a reality for our community. In December of 2015 K9-Ali joined the police department. Ali was imported from Slovakia in 2014 by Tarheel K9 in Sanford, NC. At Tarheel Ali completed a rigorous police K9 training certification where she was trained for narcotics detection, human tracking, apprehension, handler protection and article searches. I was paired with K9-Ali and completed a one-month handler course in NC, returning to work late in December of 2015. Once the handler course was successfully completed K9-Ali and I officially became a K9 team, ready to hit the street!

It's personally a dream come true for me to say I am a police K9 handler. It is a huge responsibility and carries a tremendous amount of dedication both on-duty and off. K9- Ali lives at my house with my family and comes to work with me every night. When she is off-duty she enjoys long walks and chasing tennis balls. K9-Ali is extremely social and loves attention from people of all ages!

Training is a huge part of being a K9-handler. My job is to constantly challenge Ali to learn and perform new tasks, while staying proficient in her already acquired skill set. I train with a group of other police K9 handlers twice a month and alone most nights while on-duty. The training can consist of locating a person by tracking their scent, locating drugs hidden in vehicles or buildings, checking inside buildings for hidden subjects and basic dog obedience. Training for K9-Ali is just as important as the continual training that the officers at Maple Bluff Police department receive. A common saying in Policing is, "In a high stress situation, one will always resort to their lowest level of training". I take the same approach for my training with K9-Ali. I want to train something before I ask her to perform it in the street if possible. Just like a human, a K9 is very capable of having a bad day but through training you can increase the probability of success during deployments.

When Ali is used on-duty outside of training it's called a "K9-deployment". During deployments Ali has had many successful drug searches, tracks and building clears. Some of the deployments this year include a res-

idential burglary in Fuller's Woods, attempted residential burglary in the lower bluff, possible interrupted commercial burglary in Lakewood plaza, track of missing woman from the Maple Bluff Country Club and several drug sniffs of vehicles. K9-Ali's exterior alerts to vehicles have located marijuana, crack cocaine, heroin and several items of drug paraphernalia.

K9-Ali and I have even been asked to help out other police departments, when no other K9 is available. We tracked a burglar from the house he broke into, back to his house in Fitchburg, leading to his arrest. We tracked a female who fled the house while bleeding heavily and were able to locate her in less than desirable tracking weather. We assisted another agency in a pursuit with a suspect who was threatening "suicide by cop" and had tried to take just such an action, while armed, in the past. K9- Ali was deployed and the suspect tried to stab her with two knives. Luckily, K9-Ali who was wearing her stab resistant-vest was not harmed. K9-Ali's actions allowed the suspect that night to be taken into custody without any serious injury to anyone involved.

K9-Ali and I look forward to growing stronger as a K9 team and serving the residents of Maple Bluff for many years to come. I would like to extend a special thank you to the Village board for approving the K9 program, the village residents whose donations made this possible and the K9- unit sponsors. K9- Ali's routine medical care is being provided by Dr. June Brooks of the North Side Animal Hospital and food is provided by Mounds Pet food Warehouse.

It is absolutely incredible how fast time flies by as you grow older. Yet here we are taking on a new year that isn't going to wait for us; ready or not here it is. So batten down the hatches and damn the torpedoes its full speed ahead!

Hope your holiday season went well. The month of December pounced on us with wintry weather every weekend as though to remind us that we are at the mercy of the elements and what Mother Nature has to serve us. As a department, we had plenty of time in the cab of our plow trucks as each of the snow events took a couple of days to mosey on through the Midwest. Fortunately, none of the snowfalls were major events. I would like to share a couple of observations:

*There are still a few service providers that take driveway snow and deposit it across the street onto a neighbor's terrace. Also, there are a few locations that are slow to clear the snow from sidewalks. There are ordinances that address these actions or the lack of.

*As mentioned, these snowfalls occurred during weekends in the month of December...Holiday gatherings are taking place and with that, there are large numbers of cars parked on both sides of the roadway where parties are held. The space available was insufficient to allow passage of our larger plow trucks in at least four locations. Our streamlined streets do not favor parking on both sides of the road...especially in the winter with snowbanks starting to grow. We managed by literally backing up and regrouping...with a smaller truck.

After some very cold days we are experiencing a warm up...rain is forecasted for Christmas!?! We'll have to see how Santa handles that. Losing a little snow will help with snow storage (snow banks) on the streets and along driveways. I still believe the best long term snow removal tool for driveways is the snow blower. The snow load can be directed a great distance from the driveway or sidewalk unlike a small plow vehicle that once they push and stack a pile the storage area disappears in a hurry.

We are currently addressing a few hazardous tree conditions with their removal. There will likely be additional removals and or trimmings taking place during milder periods this winter. It's never too early to start thinking about tree planting! If there has

been a recent removal and or you feel that there is an open spot for a new tree, be sure to contact me so that we can include that space for a replacement tree and discuss what type is desirable.

When placing trash and recycle containers for collection, remember to have them where they are accessible; away from poles/mailboxes/trees/shrubs/parked vehicles etc. If you are placing appliances or metals for collection be sure that they are visible and do not get lost in the snow. I recently collected a fireplace grate that was barely visible in a snow bank. One could only imagine what that would do to a vehicle's tires or underbody. We will be collecting Christmas trees that are free of ornaments and stands and placed at the terrace, not in the street the entire month of January. If you have a special collection need, give me a call and we can discuss a solution that works best.

Firefighter Training

Each Monday evening, for several hours, our firefighters and EMT's conduct training at the firehouse on new and innovative ways to provide high quality services. Sometimes the unthinkable happens and a firefighter collapses on an emergency scene. On December 19, 2016 we practiced what to do for just such a scenario. Unfortunately, the resuscitation of a downed firefighter presents a special concern: they're usually in full gear with and wearing a breathing apparatus (SCBA).

Our firefighters and EMT's were taught essential lifesaving skills, including how to efficiently remove a firefighter from their gear while performing high quality chest compressions. Like all of our skills, we hope to never utilize them in a real world application, but we're prepared if the need should arise.



Winter Fire Safety

The winter season brings the highest number of home fires, more than at any other time of year. Home fires increase in part due to cooking and heating. Winter storms can also interrupt electrical service and cause people to turn to alternative heating sources that contribute to the increased risk of fire during the winter months. The Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department recommends following these safety tips to prevent winter home fires:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period, turn off the stove.
- Space heaters need space; keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from each heater.
- Check electrical cords often and replace cracked or damaged electrical or extension cords. Do not try to repair them.

- Never use your oven or stovetop to heat your home. They are not designed for this purpose and can be a fire hazard. In addition, carbon monoxide (CO) gas is fatal to people and pets.
- Avoid using lighted candles. If you must use candles, place them in sturdy candleholders that won't burn.
- If you smoke, use only fire-safe cigarettes and smoke outside.

Winter fires are preventable. Everyone should learn how to have a safe winter season.
