Budget, Shop with a Cop, & Signs By Tim Krueger

At the November 14th Village Board meeting, the final version of the Village Budget for 2018 will be considered. As of now, there are no significant street, infrastructure or other projects planned for 2018. The Parks Committee is still working on plans for a remodel to the Beach House, but those plans seem to be trending toward a smaller remodel of the restrooms and possibly some exterior landscape changes. I would not put those projects into the significant category. Do not forget that leading up to the Budget Hearing by the Village Board on November 14th, there will be copies of the Budget for you to review at the Village Center.

On December 3rd, Police Officers and Administrative Staff of the Maple Bluff Police Department will be participating in the Shop with a Cop program. Our involvement is in association with the Dane County Shop with a Cop program. Shop with a Cop links selected children with police officers who will accompany those kids on a shopping trip to allow them to purchase presents for the upcoming holiday season. Each child has a budget that allows them to purchase presents for their family members. This is an amazing program which also provides a strong connection between the volunteers and the children.

Signs. How do you feel about miscellaneous signs being placed around the Village? Personally, I am not a big fan. I remember years ago as a young police officer removing signs that were stapled to telephone poles for various reasons. I don't like the "Mattress Sale" signs or the "Make \$800 per day at Home" signs that often turn up on corners or on the terrace. I really do not like any signs that are made at home on a torn off piece of cardboard and then plastered where people

think they can get the most viewership. To me, this is a quality of life issue in our neighborhood and one about beautification. These signs distract from both of those and, I believe they also distract from the signs that are required for traffic control. After a period of time, any sign becomes a blur to the passerby, no longer getting their attention.

There is a Maple Bluff Ordinance in Article XVIII of the Zoning Code (Chapter 225) that regulates signs. We distinguish between Residential District Signs and Business District Signage. In a Residential District, we regulate the size, placement and duration/length that these signs can be displayed. A few types of signs in the Residential District that we regulate include Garage Sale or Moving Sale signs; Signs which advertise the sale, rental or construction of residential property; signs which are temporary for special events and signs encouraging neighborhood pedestrian/child safety. Because of the various controls (size, placement, length) with these signs please contact me or review the ordinance for more guidance.

There is also an ordinance in Chapter 149-6 which regulates signs that carry political, religious or personal messages. Those signs shall be placed on private property and shall be freestanding, shall not exceed six square feet in area and four feet in height from the top of the sign to the bottom. For political signs, it is limited to one sign per candidate or issue per lot. These signs shall have no electrical, mechanical, audio auxiliary or other distracting features.

Please consider your neighbors when you are trying to convey your message and help keep Maple Bluff Beautiful!

PUBIC NOTICE TO ALL CUSTOMERS OF MAPLE BLUFF WATER UTILITY

The Maple Bluff Water Utility has filed an application with the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSCW) to increase water rates. The primary reason the requested increase is necessary is to recover the costs of additional plant investment since the last rate study.

The total increase in water revenues requested is \$114,716 which will result in an estimated overall rate increase of 26% over the water utility's present revenues. If the request is granted, the water bill for an average residential

customer with a 5/8-inch or 3/4-inch meter who uses 2,700 cubic feet of water per quarter will increase from \$145.02 to \$182.73, or 26%.

A public hearing on the application will be held on November 15th, 2017 at 10:00am in the conference room at the Village Center, 18 Oxford Place, Madison, Wisconsin.

Last Sunday, August 13th, two of Maple Bluff's scouts, Zach Wall and Jacob Darien were recognized for their personal achievement of the Eagle Rank in an official Eagle Scout Court of Honor ceremony Held in the Troop's unique 75 year old Log Cabin in Maple Bluff's Firemen's Park. Officiated by Village President Tim O'Brien, and Scout Master Dr. Benjamin Darien, the ceremony was attended by four top ranking scout officials from the local scout Council and area District, plus the Guest Speaker of Honor – Dr. John Vukich, eight Eagle Scout Alumni, and over 50 friends, neighbors and family members. 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Public Works

Fall By Tom Schroeder

The incredible fall weather which was more like a summer extension has finally been blown away by a low pressure system that brought in a more seasonal air mass. Now that reality is settling in the time frame for preparing for the change of seasons it has compressed into a smaller window. There will be much to do during the month of November with a very late end of the growing season. Fall collections will peak in a couple of weeks and before you know it there will be snow to contend with. So please, get your leaves out early and often so we can minimize the overlap of fall into winter.

Everyone has heard the suggestions on how to place materials at the streets edge on the terrace and not in road. This is a requirement so that rainfall does not wash yard waste into the storm system that is directly connected to Lake Mendota. We take pride in providing weekly yard waste and leaf collections for the village spring through fall. If it is out early Monday morning we should be able to collect it that week. Keep in mind that if cars/trucks/equipment blocks our access to the yard waste it will go uncollected until we have opportunity to return which may take a week to do as we follow our route for the entire village. We request that you also not place materials around trees/poles/mailboxes/fire hydrants as this makes it difficult to maneuver our equipment. Thanksgiving is a short work week. We will do

the best we can for collections that week with no guarantees. Get your yard waste out early and keep it out of the street! Thanks!

We have started alerting residents that are in non-compliance for residential garbage collection; specifically the size of the container and the weight limits allowed. The size of the container is limited to 30 gallons and the weight is limited to 50 lbs. There are some residents that are using 96 gallon containers (think big recycle cart) for trash. These containers weigh 35 lbs empty and could easily hold 100+ lbs. Our collection process involves public works personnel that empty your trash cans by hand. The recycle carts are collected by an automated vehicle. Give your local trash guy a break and voluntarily comply with this village ordinance. Thank You.

As we near the holiday season that is often full of family gatherings and gift giving, be prepared for the additional recycling load that comes with this time of year. Our contracted recycle hauler will not pick up materials that are outside of the carts without prior notification. For a reasonable fee they will perform a manual collection for you when arrangements are made before the day of collection.

The season is changing and we are getting after our chores; please help us help you as we take care of village collections!

We'll talk snow removal next month. P.S. buy a good snow shovel!


