Election Day February 18th

On Tuesday, February 18th, a primary election will be held for the Justice of the Supreme Court and Madison Metropolitan School District Board Seat 6. A primary means that the number of candidates will be narrowed to two for each contest and those two candidates will appear on the April 7th ballot.

Residents of Maple Bluff vote at the Village Center, 18 Oxford Place, and polls will be open from 7:00am – 8:00pm.

Three other elections will be held during 2020. Those dates are April 7th, August 11th and November 3rd.

The Bookmobile is for EVERYONE - come check us out!



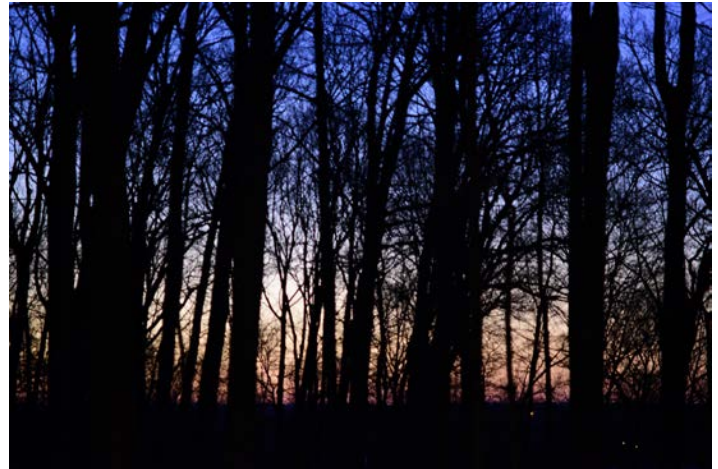

Meet Our New Administrator/Police Chief: By: Tom Schroeder

While we all are tearing January off the calendar and exposing February, your Village administration and department operations have a new commander and chief, Tanner Nystrom. I would encourage you to stop by and introduce yourself and meet our new administrator/police chief; he is an engaging and dynamic individual who has impressed from the start and continues to do so. As part of his emersion into Village operations, we arranged a meeting with our engineer from Town and Country, Brian Berquist. As far as Public Works goes, what better way to understand where we are than to know where we have come from. Brian provided a guided tour explaining the process of a capital improvement project from start to finish. He then elaborated upon the multiple projects undertaken by the Village from the early nineties; 2005; 2010; 2014 expounding on the accomplishments of each of these projects. As much as has been accomplished in the last 25-30 years, there are still significant infrastructure needs that will need to be prioritized and implemented in the near future and beyond. The specific nature of these needs would be similar to the large projects of recent history that addressed water/sanitary/storm and road reconstruction. In addition to that will be concerns of infiltration and inflow into the sanitary sewer system that can influence the amount of wastewater treatment costs from Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District. There are also concerns with some of the Village's storm water outfalls that were out of the project scopes of prior projects. Brian's presentation was an excellent depiction of the state of the Village's infrastructure.

We had a busy stretch of winter weather during the middle of January as large low-pressure systems passed by over a 3-4 day period, providing precipitation from the front/middle/backside of the storm. Remember to be a good neighbor by storing your snow on your lot, not in the street or another lot. Contractors are notorious for doing the easiest movements first. I give kudos to the service providers that clean up and place snow where it belongs.

When opportunity presents itself, we will be removing ash trees that have presented symptoms of the ash borer. I have a few trees left from last year's list and several more to add for this year. Something that I would encourage all property owners to have done every few years would be an assessment of tree health and vigor along with a trimming and pruning plan in place for your trees young and old alike. There are many very large trees in the Village that should get a review by a professional. There is more to tree health than having a crown full of leaves.



With the talk of climate change, and or global warming, or even recent trends like the last 2 years with our lakes at flood stage, it appears that higher annual precipitation rates are going to feed the high ground water that has been a concern for many years, and will be for the foreseeable future. If you are using a sump pump, please give consideration to connecting to the storm system if available. Sending ground water into the sanitary sewer is a violation of Village code. I would also recommend talking with your plumber about installing a back flow preventor for your sanitary sewer lateral.

A friendly reminder: Trash receptacles have a size limit. They also have a weight limit of container and contents.

Village Code 186-4. Preparation of solid waste for collection.

A. No container or bag placed for collection shall exceed 30 gallons in capacity or 50 pounds in weight.

B. All rubbish placed for collection shall be placed in suitable containers of not more than 30 gallons in capacity or 50 pounds in weight.

Give your local trash guy on the village crew a break and practice voluntary compliance.

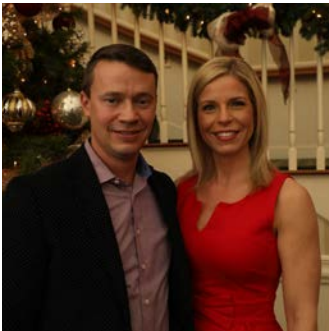

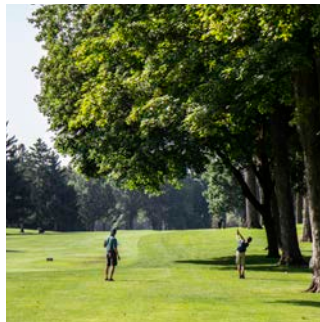

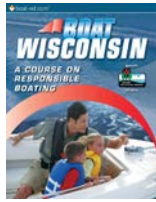

6. Include the DNR customer number. If you don't have one call 1-888-936-7463 to receive a number. This is the same number used for hunter, snowmobile etc issued by the DNR.
7. Include the phone number of each student.
8. Include the addresses of each student for the DNR certificate.
9. Address you want the text sent to if different from that on the check.

DO THIS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE
