February turned out to be a very productive and busy month! I want to start by thanking all of the residents, elected officials, and staff that have dedicated their time to serving our community. A notable highlight for me was to observe our election volunteers who, once again, made it possible for our village to achieve some of the highest turnout rates in the county – over 34% of registered voters! High turnout rates for a local election is a testament of our community's level of engagement and overall health. I want to publicly thank all of our volunteers and staff whose selfless efforts made the process a success.



In addition to providing exceptional daily services, staff have been extremely flexible in our pursuit for personal and professional growth. As a small municipal government, we are always open to innovative ways we can improve – especially when those improvements come without financial burden. As an example, in February village staff and I met with a team of graduate students from the University of Wisconsin's La Follette School of Public Affairs. The La Follette team agreed to assist our village with the creation of a performance evaluation and mentoring program framework; which coincides with a broader project of refining our human resources practices. I think that this project presents our municipality with a unique opportunity to improve our systems and habits while supporting employee interests – enhancing feedback, support, and welfare. I was fortunate to work with the village on a leadership transition project during my time at the La Follette School and the experience was a highlight of my academic career. I am very excited to partner with the La Follette School once again and we look forward to a continuation of our mutually beneficial relationship!





Finally, I want to take the opportunity to commend our police officers and staff for their exceptionally hard work last month. We held an open recruitment for full-time and part-time officers which required significant time and effort from all involved. Additionally, our officers and investigators dealt with a number of challenging

situations with exemplary professionalism. Although they regularly address resident concerns – such as speeding, parking, and incomplete stops – they were also involved in high speed pursuits, made several felony arrests, and intervened in multiple psychological health crises. Our officers are truly dynamic individuals who are committed to the service and protection of our community. I am very proud that we are able to attract such a caliber of citizen given the present social, economic, and political challenges for the profession. But despite the broader challenges we face as police officers, we are a fortunate few – I regularly remind our officers how lucky we are to serve a community that supports and values what we do. From our officers, I say thank you for your patience and encouragement.

From all of our staff, I want to thank you for your continued support! We continue to strive for the best possible services to our community and look forward for exciting things to come.

From The Department of Public Works: By: Tom Schroeder

If it at all feels like winter has been around for what seems like forever...well...it has! At least since late October when we had a good dose of wintery weather and then November and December seemed to switch places on the calendar. Not to worry though for January and February provided plenty of seasonal conditions for all of us to deal with. Now that March is here to usher in the start of spring, we should be able to start preparing for the green up that is so cherished in this part of the country.

With the coming spring we will continue with the removal of ash trees that are displaying signatures of the ash beetle. We will address ash trees that display structural concerns first and then move on to the trees that show significant infestation next. We will likely have trees that will have to wait until next year for lack of time and opportunity, but most likely budget constraints.

As I have done for all my years as the Urban Forester, I will reserve funds for replacement trees to renew the urban forest. As necessary as the removals are for damaged/infected and dying trees, so is the need for replacement in as timely a fashion as possible.

Planting new trees has always been a favorite activity of mine, and I am more than willing to work with residents in the decision-making process to give a tree a good home.

There will be some terrace work for us this spring as there have been plenty of snow clearing events this season. A few of the snowfalls were extremely heavy as the precipitation fluctuated between rain/sleet/snow and was a challenge to clear the roads. Snow needs to stay on the property of origin. When driveway or sidewalk snow is placed in the street, it adds to the street load that has to be moved to the right-of-way for storage. Mis-placing the snow means your neighbor is getting more than they should. It is noticeable when contractors push snow to the other side of the street. After one



or two snow plowings of driveways, there is little a contractor can do...unless they use snowblowers to direct the snow further into the lawn for a more effective and efficient way to store residential snow.

This spring we will be generating a list of potholes to repair prior to determining the roadways of the village to be good candidates for chip sealing later this summer/fall.

A similar list will be generated for sidewalk repair/replacement to address broken/misaligned concrete squares.

We are currently discussing options available for rehabilitation of sanitary and storm system pipes that need various degrees of rehabilitation or renewal.

Several of these needs will be prioritized once the financial impact is realized.





Camp Ya-Gotta-Wanna Counselors:

CYGW is currently seeking enthusiastic, responsible counselors to provide a safe, fun experience for participants at CYGW.
