As we move into fall, we celebrate the change of seasons and the evolving beauty around us. As a "Tree City" we will be blessed with the spectacular annual transition from summer to winter. Autumn brings apple orchards, pumpkin farms, college football, raking leaves (continuously), Halloween, and cozy evenings near the fireplace. It is truly a wonderful time of year. However, with the change of seasons, come changes to how we work and live in the Village.

With the days getting shorter and the nights longer, we increase the risks associated with sharing the road with our dedicated morning and evening walkers and cyclists. As visibility declines, the likelihood of a crash increases es exponentially. So walkers and cyclists, please carry a flashlight and wear brightly colored clothing while enjoying the crisp fall air. Be sure to walk facing traffic, and follow the "rules of the road." Same goes for cyclists; bright clothing, lights front and rear, and care in your travels – especially at intersections.

For those driving, PLEASE SLOW DOWN! Our Village Administrator – Police Chief and Village Board members have received an increasing number of complaints of people driving WAY over the posted speed limits as well as ignoring or rolling through stop signs. The issue has become so prevalent that we have referred a number of suggestions to the Public Works Committee for their recommendation. You can expect to see more in the way of traffic control measures and enforcement.

As mentioned earlier, fall brings curling up next to the fire. But here, too, we need to make sure that we are doing all we can to make this a safe and enjoyable experience. Since January, 1, the U.S. Fire Administration reports that there have been 33 fire-related fatalities in Wisconsin. But that doesn't paint the whole pic-

ture. Every year there are numerous fire-related injuries resulting in hospitalization. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services reports that In 2005, burns resulted in 666 hospitalizations, and 7,773 visits to the emergency department. All preventable! October is Fire Prevention Month and to celebrate, our fire / rescue department will be hosting an open house that provides people of all ages with valuable tips and measures you can take to make your home safe from fire. Be sure to attend.

Finally, Autumn is the beginning of cold and flu season. Flu vaccines are safe, effective and inexpensive. They are widely available and are recommended for those 2 months of age and up. Be sure to get one as soon as possible. They are available through your healthcare provider or local pharmacy. Similarly, you can be vaccinated at any number of local vaccination clinics. Again – a simple and easy way to protect you and those around you.

In closing, I offer these simple suggestions to make your Autumn the wonderful time of year it is. Stay safe, be well, and take care of one another. Regards, Carl Vieth Village President

It is with mixed feelings that I announce Sergeant Kyle Dabbs has made the difficult decision to resign from the Maple Bluff Police Department as of 3 October. Sergeant Dabbs started as a Patrol Officer for our department on 20 March 2009, was promoted to the position of K9 Handler in December 2015 and was then promoted again to the rank of Sergeant (Operations) in 2019. Since his promotion in 2019, Sergeant Dabbs has been instrumental in developing new officers, ensuring quality policing standards were continuously achieved, and maintaining a culture of positive attitude amongst our team. His natural ability to lead, teach, and mentor made him an integral contributor to our department, and he will be missed. Although losing Sergeant Dabbs is difficult, we are excited for him as he embarks on the next phase of his professional life, attending an accelerated academy for the Madison Police Department. Please join me in congratulating Sergeant Dabbs on pursuing the next steps of his law enforcement career and thanking him for the past 12 years of service to the Village of Maple Bluff!

Here we are in the last days of September enjoying ideal weather, warm and sunny daytime and cool and comfortable nighttime. Perfect! We all know of course that this will change...abruptly at times...hopefully it will be a tranquil transformation allowing us to enjoy the pleasures that autumn delivers. If the warm days and cool nights persist, we should be in for spectacular colors as the trees grudgingly give in to the seasonal change.

With that change approaching we are preparing equipment for the fall collections. As gardens are broken down and leaves begin to fall, please follow guidelines for materials to be collected effectively and efficiently. There are reasons we request/insist that yard/garden waste be separated into like piles. Example: leaves, sticks, garden debris commingled is likely to clog our equipment requiring significant down time to remedy. Another example: rocks, bricks, metal are placed in a leaf pile. This can be hazardous to the operators of the equipment as well as the machines themselves. So please place yard debris separated so we see a pile of leaf's, a pile of sticks, a pile of yard waste, etc. One more item... no pest waste mixed in any of the piles, this we will refuse. Thank You!

We have been working on ash tree reduction and will continue until all village right of way and park ash trees that are infected are removed. As other hazard trees are identified we will address them as well. Our budget will allow a few more removals this year. There are several stumps to be ground out. We will see if we can remove and restore yet this year, if not it will be done in the spring. I do see our primary efforts for next year will be addressing street tree trimming and pruning as well as tree replacement.

The garden spaces along Lakewood Blvd. will be evaluated for sustainability. Considerations will likely include alterations to dimension; plantings; shrubs; perennial's; stones etc. Even the removal plantings and returning it to turf.

We have addressed some road surface issues on Farwell Dr (LeRoy to Marina) with grinding and filling with hot mix asphalt and should be able to address a few more issues before leaf season takes over our lives.

We are preparing winter equipment now before any urgent scenario presents itself. All snow removal equipment will get a tune up, air filters, oil and oil filters, grease/lube, cutting edges and glides adjusted. The salt and sand vehicles and other plow trucks will be ready as well.

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Fire Prevention. By: Kris Loy, Fire Chief

National Fire Prevention Week October 3-9, 2021: Since 1922, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in our country. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide lifesaving public education to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires. Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific conflagration killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres of land. This year's fire prevention week campaign, "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety!" works to educate everyone about the different sounds smoke and carbon monoxide alarms make. Knowing what to do when an alarm sounds will keep you and your family safe. When an alarm makes noises - a beeping sound or a chirping sound - you must act.



What is your alarm telling you? SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

- 7. Include the phone number of each student.
- 8. Include the addresses of each student for the DNR certificate.
- 9. Address you want the text sent to if different from that on the check.

DO THIS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE

We have a maximum of 30 students per class, and the classes fill quickly. I will send you the text when I receive your check. When you receive the text you will be registered for the class.

I am happy to take over as Park & Recreation Chair for the Village of Maple Bluff. Special thanks to Patrick Grant, who did a wonderful job the last 3 years at the helm of Parks Committee and was able to construct 3 new playgrounds! We are still considering a revamp of Johnson Park and have decided to take a pause on the planning so we can gather more input from village residents about what this park might look like in the future. Addition of pollinator plants, nature-scape and a playground replacement of some kind are high on our list, but nothing is set in stone and we'll be sure to engage our neighbors as we move closer to any changes at the park. We anticipate that the planning will take place over the next year, with no projects starting until 2022 at the very earliest. It's important to be thoughtful about this large public space as we move forward, taking into account how any additions to the park would affect adjacent neighbors. We'll also work with our hardworking village staff in determining what kind of maintenance and upkeep will be needed for any new additions to the park. More to come on this -- please keep an eye on your inboxes for a survey later this fall!

As we roll out of summer and into fall, we look forward to our village children participating in some of the great activities within the village. Flag football, basketball, robotics and more -- please see our Village of Maple Bluff Recreation page for offerings! We are coming off a great summer season for CYGW and A&A -- look for these to return in 2022! Please start talking with your middle school or high school aged children about their interest in either volunteering as a Big Buddy for CYGW or in working as a camp counselor. We'll also be needing lifeguards for Beach Park! Big Buddies must be 11 years old, counselors should be 14 years old, and lifeguards need to be 15 years old.
