To support this initiative, Fire Chief Kris Loy was recently assigned the responsibility of coordinating and aligning our outreach efforts on these various information platforms. This assignment was one of many additional responsibilities assigned to Chief Loy as he was recently promoted to be the Village's first Public Safety Director. As many of you know, Chief Loy has been an integral member of our team for some time, starting his career as an intern with our Fire Department in 2001. I want to extend my congratulations to Chief Loy and express my support for him in his expanded role with the Village.

With the holidays come some friendly reminders. As you travel out of town or have overnight visitors, please submit vacation requests and overnight parking requests on our police department's page of the village website (<https://villageofmaplebluff.com/home/departments/police-department/>). Vacation requests allow our officers to be even more watchful of your home while you are away and allow them to contact you should there be a need. As for parking, we generally prohibit vehicles from parking on the street overnight which ensures our Public Works crew can remove leaves, snow, and other debris. Off-street parking also ensures that emergency response vehicles can travel safely, while also arriving at any potential incident in the timeliest manner. Additionally, vehicles in the roadway during hours of darkness limits visibility of drivers, decreases safety of pedestrians, and enables cover for criminal activity.

The holiday season can bring much joy to families but can also present unforeseen challenges. We are here to assist wherever we can and are always open to helping those in need. Fire Prevention. By: Kristopher Loy, Fire Chief

Frequently Asked Questions: Thank you to everyone who was able to attend our fire prevention open house in October. We were excited to finally see everyone in person again. During the event we gave fire extinguisher demonstrations, fire truck rides, showed off our gear, spoke about fire safety, and performed vehicle extrication demonstrations. We also answered several questions about our department and how we operate. We'd like to share some of those questions in case you were wondering as well...

Q: Does the MBFD have volunteer firefighters and EMTs?

A: Yes. The MBFD has a combination of volunteer, intern, and paid staff. While we do employ four full-time staff, the fire chief and three assistant fire chiefs, much of our staff consists of professionally trained firefighter/EMT volunteers and interns.

Q: How many fire trucks do you have?

A: Two. We operate two fire engines/pumpers, one command SUV, and one rescue boat. These apparatus are equipped to deal with nearly all fire, EMS, and rescue situations. In the event of a larger scale incident, our community participates in the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) which helps provide additional fire and EMS resources from departments throughout the states of WI and IL.

Q: Why does a fire truck show up when I call for an ambulance?

A: The Village of Maple Bluff contracts its 911 ambulance transport services with Ryan Brothers EMS. They send their closest available ambulance, but typically it is responding from over 8 minutes away. To decrease the amount of time between when you call 911 and when help arrives, the Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department responds to all 911 calls. Our staff is trained and licensed at the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) level and can perform lifesaving procedures and administer IV medications as needed prior to an ambulance arriving. This allows our residents to receive lifesaving care within minutes of calling for help.



Q: Are you looking for more volunteers?

A: Yes! Our department is currently looking for motivated individuals to join our team. The MBFD protects the Village of Maple Bluff by providing 24/7 emergency 911 response to a multitude of incidents, including fires, vehicle extrications, water rescues, and emergency medical calls. With department paid certification training, per call/training stipend, and state of the art equipment, the MBFD wants to hear from you. Great Time of Year! By: Tom Schroeder, Director Public Works

This is a great time of year...if the weather cooperates... so far so good! However, as prior weather patterns have shown, we are likely to have the other end of the spectrum at some point. As with many earthly things be prepared for and expect change, its just a matter of time. The tree colors are nice, and the overnight temperature has been flirting with the freezing mark, so it is time to collect the fallen leaves and place them on the terrace near the streets edge for collection. As has been mentioned over the years, please place all materials in their own pile, do not co-mingle garden waste; sticks and branches; dirt or rocks etc. All these materials need to be separated for proper and safe collection. Mixing materials will delay the collection process...it might even do damage to the equipment and the operators. Avoid placing materials near obstacles like poles, mailboxes, trees, vehicles, and equipment. Doing so will likely delay or prevent the collection from taking place. Try to avoid putting leaves in or near street gutters and storm drains to keep our lakes healthy.

Another subject that we have requested voluntary cooperation with has been size of trash receptacles and the weight of contents of these large receptacles. See below:

Maple Bluff Code 186-3. Preparation of solid waste for collection.

- A.** No container or bag placed for collection shall exceed 30 gallons in capacity or 50 pounds in weight.
- B.** All rubbish placed for collection shall be placed in suitable containers of not more than 30 gallons in capacity or 50 pounds in weight.
- C.** Any garbage or rubbish not placed for collection in accordance with the provisions of this chapter may be refused by the collector.
- D.** All persons having solid waste, including recyclable materials, shall place the same in suitable containers not sooner than 24 hours prior to the regularly scheduled collection time, and no person shall permit solid waste or containers thereof to accumulate or remain at the curb line longer than 12 hours.



I would wager that there will be further discussion regarding the concerns of health and safety of our Public Works employees; the Code 186-3; methods of enforcement.

Snow is just around the corner! Be good neighbors and place snow on your terrace and or yard, not in the street or on your neighbors' terrace. Service providers need to know how to store snow effectively and efficiently. Snow blowers are the most effective allowing precise placement. Snowplows end up stacking and run out of storage space after one or two snow events when used in driveways. Discuss the options with your service provider.

We have Thanksgiving later this month! I'll be giving thanks that I have had the privilege and good fortune to have worked for a great community for over 30 years. I just might have a couple more years left to give.

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10-DIGIT DIALING FOR PHONE CALLS

The Federal Communications Commission is reminding most Wisconsin residents, including Maple Bluff, that 10-digit dialing for all phone calls began October 24, 2021.

The FCC wants everyone in the 262, 414, 608, and 920 area codes to start using all ten digits when dialing someone, even when they are making local calls. The FCC says seven-digit numbers will still connect for a few more months so people can get used to the changeover.

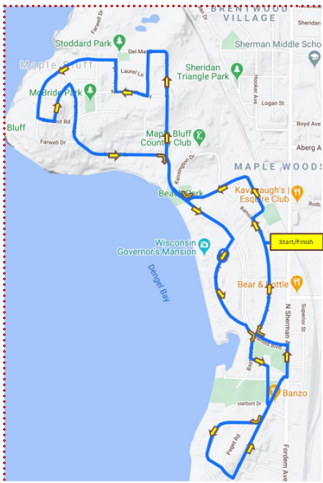
After October 24, 2021, seven-digit local calls may no longer work. Instead, they may not connect, and callers will hear a recording telling people the number can't be completed as dialed. In those cases, the person will have to hang up and dial again, with the area code. In all, area codes in 36 states, including most of Wisconsin, will be affected by this change.

The FCC explained the change is being made to help establish 988 as a new, nationwide crisis hotline

number, akin to 911, that connects individuals to suicide prevention and mental health crisis counselors. After the parts of the country that are switching to ten-digit-only numbers, such as most of Wisconsin, have completed the move, the new hotline will launch. Currently, that is slated for July 16, 2022.

Until that point, the FCC reminds everyone that they can still reach the National Suicide Prevention Hotline by calling 1-800-273-8255 (1-800-273-TALK), or through online chats. There is also a crisis hotline dedicated to veterans that can be reached by pressing 1 after dialing, chatting online at www.veteranscrisisline.net, or by texting 8388255.D
