It's hard to believe that spring started around 6 weeks ago...it has more resembled an extension of winter over that time period. Maybe that's a little extreme, but not by much. The green up could use more sun and fewer low-pressure systems that loiter over the Midwest for a week at a time. Warmer days are sure to come, and the outdoor activities will be more enjoyable.

We finally aligned a decent day along with opportunity to remove an old hackberry in Fullers Woods that we have had our eyes on for some time. A week before when we finished installation of the Marina Pier in 30-40 mph winds (crazy...Yes) we were alerted to a tree that lost a limb in Fullers Woods. Upon inspection the tree was not going to last long with the unyielding winds. We wrapped a chain around it and notched it to pull it over and cut it up. We had superior leverage, and all went well.

We have a dozen stumps to grind out and then restore. With that we will have topsoil that we can double back and check on any plow scrapes that still need our attention.

Our tree order is ready for pick-up. A nice variety with a strong presence of maple, after all, oaks and crabs and

several other species. I look forward to planting every one of them.

Thank you to all the residents that retired their non-conforming trash container. There is still a need to make additional contacts with a few residents that are still using an oversized non-conforming container, I look forward to talking with you soon.

You may have seen us from time to time in the streets or the terrace and even in your back yards digging and probing in the soils. What we are doing is locating utilities such as water curb stops or sanitary manholes. There are several storm water outfalls that pass-through properties to the lake shore. Our reasons to do so are maintenance and inspections and or to satisfy a Diggers Hotline Call. It's coming to be that time of year when we will be inspecting the systems to see that all is well.

Please place yard waste on the terrace and not in the road. Materials can get swept away when it rains and end up in the storm system that leads to the lake.

Looking forward to seeing spring really showing up!

In previous articles, I and other scouts have discussed different aspects of emergency preparedness. These articles covered emergency prevention and making emergency kits. If you would like to read the articles, visit villageofmaplebluff.com on your mobile device or computer and go to the newsletter page. Reading these articles will help educate you and your family on emergency preparedness which is the general field of preventing and preparing for any endangerment that may affect you and your family.

Preparing an Emergency Action Plan is one of the last steps to becoming prepared for any emergency. Imagine a tornado quickly strikes the area and your family is separated, the power grid is down so you don't have cellphone service. You will want a plan for what to consider and what to do in the midst of the disaster because in the event of an emergency, you will have hundreds of extra things to worry about. To help families navigate emergencies the Federal Emergency Management Agency suggests that family members meet to ask and answer the series of 5 questions listed below.

1. How will I receive emergency alerts and warnings? (hand-crank radio, local fire department)
2. What is my shelter plan? (A relatives home or hotel outside of the disaster area)
3. What is my evacuation route? (Each family should

have multiple routes out of the area to ensure they can successfully evacuate)

4. What is my household communication plan? (Assume the power grid is down, where will your family meet and how will each family member get there?)
5. Do I need my emergency preparedness kit? (Include the location of your kit in the plan, what to pack in your kit can be found in the April newsletter)

As a family or individual, you should go through these questions, writing your plan for each question. Once your plan for each question is made and written down, create a copy for an out of town relative or friend, one for the local fire department, and an extra one in case you lose the original copy, laminate all of them.

Additional things to consider when making your Emergency Action Plan are responsibilities for helping others, age ranges of your household members, disabilities, dietary needs, medical needs, and pets. Along with your written plan should be household phone numbers including the phone number of children's schools, medical providers, workplace contacts, and insurance providers.

Going through the five questions above is a great start to becoming better prepared for emergency situations. I encourage you and your loved ones to continue working to prepare for the worst. Keep your eyes, ears, and mind open to ideas of ways to make your lives safer everyday.

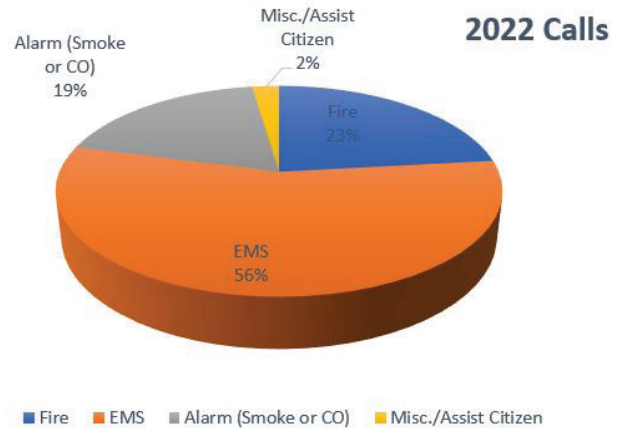

Burning Rubbish: Debris burning is the number one cause of wildfires and outside fires in Wisconsin. Using fire as a method to dispose of vegetative yard waste isn't the only option. While debris burning is legal on your property, let's face the facts...it's unsafe, unhealthy, and a nuisance. If you choose to burn, please follow these simple guidelines to ensure you are burning safely and legally.

BEFORE BURNING

- Find alternatives to burning debris before deciding to burn.
- Obtain burn permit from the Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department (\$50.00).
- Make certain you are only burning legal materials.
- Keep an eye on the weather and avoid burning under windy conditions.
- Make certain the area adjacent to the fire is free of all flammables.

DURING BURNING

- Have a water source and firefighting tools handy.
- Keep the size of the fire small and manageable.
- Maintain a mineral soil firebreak around the burn area.
- Never leave your fire unattended.
- If weather conditions change for the worst, put the fire out.
- If your fire escapes, dial 911 immediately!



AFTER BURNING

- Make sure the burn is completely out before leaving.
- Use lots of water, drown, stir and repeat until cold.
- Go back and check again later for any remaining smoke or embers.
- Fun fact: use cold ashes from your burn as a bed for your garden. It makes a great fertilizer!

ALLOWED

- Brush, Leaves, Pine Needles, Grass, Clean wood

NOT ALLOWED

- Garbage, Plastics, Shingles, Foam, Structures, Furniture, Wire, Metal, Electronics, Vinyl products, Rubber products, Oil-based products, Painted, stained or treated wood
