#### Improving our Services to You! By: Tanner Nystrom, Village Administrator/Police Chief

September brings a change of season and time of transition for our team at the Village Center. Summer elections and programming are complete, budgeting season is upon us, and our Public Works team is making sure they are well prepared for their fall routines. At the same time, we have several projects keeping staff engaged – ranging from a transition to new water meter software that will give residents direct access to their water utility data and billing, to standing up our Fire Department's EMS transport capabilities to ensure our residents receive the fastest high-quality EMS response services possible. These initiatives are a direct reflection of our mission to passionately deliver exemplary public services and responsible governance to improve the experience and value of our community. We are grateful for the opportunity to improve our services to you in the coming year!

Although there are many topics I could share here, I would like to use this opportunity to address a concern that seems to be rising among residents. The increased number of gun related incidents near the village have rightfully gained the attention of many. Gun violence in proximity to our neighborhood is troubling however, I want to reassure you that our community remains safe. Admittedly, I am careful in optimism because there is a legitimate safety concern that has become more prevalent over the past few years but, at the same time, violent crime in our community remains a very rare occurrence. Our officers have responded to multiple shots fired events near the village in the past few months, but these events have remained outside of our communi-

ty. Nobody can guarantee immunity from tragedy or malevolence, but I can assure you that our officers are exceptionally dedicated to their roles as peace officers and strive to keep our community safe, day-in and day-out.

We have a professional team who applies specific policing strategies to keep you safe, as well as improve the experience and value of our community. Every police department must carefully choose what policing strategies to pursue based on the specific goals they seek to accomplish. We prioritize maintaining exceptional police services, developing trusting relationships, reinforcing officer competence and safety, fostering team-oriented professionalism, and promoting criminal deterrence. We maintain criminal deterrence through a strategy focused on public engagement, proactive communications and actions, officer presence, rapid response, and investigative vigor. In short, our team is capable, competent, and confident in their abilities. They continue to prove themselves as consummate professionals and I am proud to represent them.

Last month, I closed by noting that "an organization is only as good as the people it is composed of". I will add to this truism by saying our organization is great because of the great people we have and serve. Thank you all for your support and continuing to look out for one another.

#### Change of Season. By: Tom Schroeder, Director Public Works

As the ninth month of the year arrives so does the summer begin its departure. This change of seasons may not have the favor of the onset of spring as spring awakens, nor the anticipated fun in the sun that summer can bring, none the less it is the fall season that I enjoy the best. The cooler temperatures allow for a more dynamic activity level. I still look forward to the football season; tailgating/grilling; yard work and seeing the colors that the trees transform into as they confirm that the growing season is over.

We are still dealing with the aftermath of the storms from June. There have been some other unfortunate tree issues...a mature pin oak succumbed to a lightning strike; a mature catalpa tree had suddenly experienced severe die back. Several unexpected tree removals along with addressing the ash trees that are left has required reevaluation as to what our next assignment may be.

With the change of season, we will also see gardens being dismantled and the coming fall providing much to do for our collection process. How you present materials for collection has an enormous impact on our effectiveness and efficiency as we make our weekly rounds. Unlike recycling we can not have materials co-mingled. Yard waste must be broken down into separate piles on the terrace and not in the street to protect from storm water

pollution. Garden waste; sticks; branches; leaves need to be separated and not mixed. Also, the materials should not be placed by obstacles like poles/mailboxes/trees/cars/equipment/trash/recycle...this will only delay or prevent collection. Your help is not only appreciated, it is necessary for us to succeed in implementing our services for Maple Bluff.

AT&T will be starting their undergrounding project as they install fiber. The street work will be very noticeable, the off-street work not as much. It is a big project that will take several weeks to complete. Much of the upper bluff will see the activity of this installation project.

Village staff will be walking the sanitary utility routes that are to be part of a Capital Infrastructure Project in 2023. Anticipate seeing utility markings for the engineers to record locations and we will use the physical review of locations of manholes/pipes to help determine the best processes and procedures to be implemented. The project is concentrating on off street utilities, specifically sanitary and stormwater pipe rehabilitation.

Our department currently has an open position, and we are actively pursuing talented applicants!






#### Fire Rescue Department! By: Kristopher Loy, Fire Chief

**2022 Response Information:** As of August 29, 2022, the Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department had responded to 100 calls for service in 2022 with an average response time of 5 minutes and 17 seconds within the Village. Here is a list of the calls we've responded to.

Emergency Medical Services: After careful consideration and deliberation at public meetings held May 18, 2022, July 26, 2022, August 3, 2022, and August 9, 2022 the Village Board of Trustees, Finance Committee, and Fire/EMS Committee unanimously voted to support the operation of an ambulance by the Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department. The MBFD has been licensed and staffed to provide EMS services at the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) level since January 1, 2011, but without the ability to transport.

Our staff is diligently working through the approval processes with the State EMS Office and is also working with vendors to acquire the necessary equipment. This includes the purchase of an ambulance. If you are interested in helping to fund the purchase of any portion of the new equipment please contact Chief Loy, kloy@villageofmaplebluff.com or 608-244-3390. Ryan Brothers EMS will continue to provide 911 transport services for our community during this transitional period. Our staff is excited to be able to expand our service capabilities to best suit the needs of our residents.

**Dane County Fire Truck Parade:** The Dane County Fire Chiefs Association will be kicking off Fire Prevention Week 2022 with a fire truck parade up State Street on Sunday, October 9<sup>th</sup>, 2022, 1:00pm. Fire trucks from throughout Dane County, including Maple Bluff, will be on display on the Capitol Square following the parade.

**CPR Classes:** The Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department is hosting CPR classes throughout 2022. These classes are being held at no cost to Village residents.


