Ch ch ch changes! October is a time where we bid summer adieu and prepare for winter. Days are shorter – nights are longer. Because many of us are now commuting at dawn or dusk, we must be adapting our driving, cycling, and running / walking habits to assure safety. Lighting, high-visibility clothing, situational awareness and reducing the speed of your vehicle will go a long way to assure the safety of all. With school in session, we need to be extra vigilant of children waiting for the bus. In the past we have seen people on bikes and in cars illegally passing school busses that have their lights flashing and stop signs deployed. Stop it! Seriously, STOP IT!

With autumn, we are the beneficiaries of the spectacular change of colors. Our lush foliage makes its transition from green to a myriad of vibrant yellows, oranges, and reds. As the soil cools in the cool autumn nights, trees begin to shed their foliage in preparation for the inevitable snow that will cover their branches. The leaves need to go somewhere – and gravity takes care of that, leaving a leafy covering on lawns and parkways. Though they may seem harmless – even fun (jumping into a pile of leaves? Priceless!), the leaves pose a significant hazard to our precious lakes.

As leaves decay, they release large amounts of phosphorous that is easily washed into our lakes. This year's leaves become next year's lake algae. And with the algae comes health hazards, closed beaches, and that odor we all know and hate. According to the Clean Lakes Alliance (check out their web site - https://

<u>www.cleanlakesalliance.org/leaves/</u>) - here are some interesting facts regarding urban leaves:

- Over the course of the year, more than 50% of phosphorus in urban stormwater can come from leaves in the street
- In the fall, REMOVING LEAVES FROM THE STREET (my emphasis) before it rains can reduce the amount of phosphorus in urban stormwater by 80% compared to no leaf removal

So, there's good news and bad. The good news is that our Department of Public Works Department removes leaves from every village residence at least once a week! And those leaves are composted to become future organic fertilizer. Bad news is that way too many Village residents insist on depositing their leaves in the street. With every subsequent rain – phosphorous – summer algae. One common myth is that having leaves on the terrace next to the street will kill lawn grass – NOPE! In addition, piles of leaves in the street create traffic hazards and make clean-up difficult. So, please be considerate of your neighbors and natural resources and keep your leaves on the terrace.

Finally, be sure to get out and enjoy the view!

The seasons have definitely changed! With cool down taking place the trees will release charges and set them free...we are prepping our collection equipment in anticipation of the fall. Please display collected yard waste for collection on the terrace and not onto the street to prevent debris to be swept away into the storm system that leads directly to the lake. All materials need to be placed and separated into like piles: leaves separated from sticks separated from branches separated from garden debris etc. Failure to separate materials will delay or prevent their collection. Allow space between different materials and provide placement away from trees, poles, mailboxes, fire hydrants, vehicles and equipment. There are numerous examples on display every year where materials are placed next to fixed objects, vehicles or stacked upon one another like a seven-layer salad. Please take the time to separate materials properly for it will allow us to be as efficient and effective as possible. Our primary activity will be collecting leaves until the snow flies, or the temperature prevents us from using the collection equipment.

The beach pier will be removed as soon as possible.

The marina pier will be removed as soon as possible after the boat slips are removed.

As fall continues, we will prepare for the next season... I'll call it the Holiday Season! Get your vehicles, small equipment and home furnaces tuned up now rather than later. Enjoy the colors of autumn, call with your questions and concerns.

2022 Beaches Report Provided by PHMDC

Madison & Dane County Public Health distributed the E. coli testing results to municipalities who participate in the program on September 12. The Village's swimming area at Beach Park was only closed once due to high levels of E. coli, which was on June 14th, immediately following the June 13th storms. By comparison the Village's Beach was closed 12 times in 2021. PHMDC does not test the water quality for the presence of blue-green algae as conditions can change rapidly for growths. The Village closed the water for swimming due to potential blue-green algae blooms 3 times in 2022.

Firemen's Park Fence

After receiving approvals from the Parks and Recreation Committee, Building Board, and Village Board the fence installation at Firemen's Park was completed on September 14th. The purpose of the fence project was to provide a barrier to the Wisconsin & Southern Rail Corridor. The project was funded through the Village's Bocce Funds raised from 2021 & 2022.



Marina Pier

The Summer lease will end on Saturday, October 15th. Summer tenants will need to have their property removed from the Marina by the end of the 15th, which will allow the Village's contractor to remove hoists in a timely manner. If you need outdoor winter storage, the Village has a handful of opportunities remaining.

Tennis & Soccer Net Removals

The windscreens at Beach Park will be removed by mid-October. This process is completed prior to the strong fall winds that help pave the way for the encroaching winter months. The tennis nets will remain up until the first forecasted snowfall. The soccer nets at Johnson Park will be removed near the end of October or as the weather allows.


