#### Month of November! By: Carl Vieth, Village President

November isn't usually the month that pops into one's mind as their favorite. Though it is important to note many of history's game changers were born in November. King Charles of England, Marie Antionette – Queen of France, General George Patton, and Rodney Dangerfield! All November babies! Even yours truly, ME! I'm a November baby too; and I'll be celebrating on November 8, election day! I realize that I may not be a game changer to the level of other November peeps, but I needed a way to make a smooth transition to election day, and admittedly, toot my horn a bit. My apologies.

Yes, election day is November 8<sup>th-</sup> and a very important election it is - but aren't they all? This month we will be choosing elected officials on the national, state, and local level. Almost every race is contested, and most are very close; many are too close to call. That is why it is critical for each and every registered voter to exercise their civic responsibility and vote. This year's ballot will likely set the policies that will guide how our government operates for the foreseeable future. And the future is in your hands.

I will not be formally endorsing any candidate or platform. What I will do is vote for the people who best represent my interests and vision at the national, state, and local levels. My interests and priorities are likely different from yours, and I urge you to carefully review the candidates' positions on issues important to you. The Village website contains detailed information on voting, including absentee in-person voting, voting on election day, and voter registration. It also has contact information so you may have any questions answered. As an FYI, absentee in person voting (i.e., early voting) is now open and available to all qualified voters.

I would be remiss if I did not address the issue of election integrity. Our Village, led by Village Clerk and Deputy Administrator Sarah Danz, provides safe, secure, and ACCURATE election results. We follow rigorous election security policies, procedures, and protocols. Our vote count tabulations are accurate and reproducible, and our voting machines are secure and rigorously tested. Similarly, our poll workers are well trained and supervised; all while making our voting experience pleasant and convenient. They deserve our upmost respect and appreciation.

But November 8 will not be the end of important elections (and hopefully, not the end of Birthdays). For the Village, we will have our Village Caucus in January. The caucus process is our method for selecting candidates for the Village Board and Village President. This coming year, the presidency as well as three Village Board seats will be on the April ballot. The President and Village Board are instrumental in setting the course for the Village. I would urge everyone to consider putting their name in the hat. Serving our Village as a Trustee or President is rewarding and important to maintaining the quality of life here in Maple Bluff. This is a place where you can, and will, make a difference. I urge you to strongly consider this tremendous volunteer opportunity. See you at the polls!

# November 8th Election Information

<u>General Election</u> means a regularly scheduled local, state or national election in which voters elect officeholders.

**Registering to vote or checking registration** <u>status</u> Please visit myvote.wi.gov to verify registration status. Mail-in and online registration is closed. Please visit the Village Center in-person, during regular office hours, to register. Registration on Election Day is also available.

<u>Requesting an absentee ballot</u> If you are a registered voter and wish to request an absentee ballot, please visit myvote.wi.gov to complete your request.

**Before returning your ballot** Verify that there are two signatures, both voter and witness, and the witness address on the absentee envelope. Your ballot can not be counted if these are missing.

**Returning your absentee ballot** The use of drop boxes and hand delivering someone else's ballot are NOT allowed. Voted ballots should be mailed back via USPS or hand delivered <u>by the voter</u> directly to a staff member during regular business hours or on Election Day.

**Election Day** Polls at 18 Oxford Place will be open from 7:00am until 8:00pm on Election Day.

**<u>Regular Office Hours</u>** 8:00am-4:00pm Monday – Friday

As you travel out of town or have overnight visitors, please submit vacation requests and overnight parking requests on our police department's page of the village website (https://villageofmaplebluff.com/home/departments/ police-department/). Vacation requests allow our officers to be even more watchful of your home while you are away and allow them to contact you should there be a need. As for parking, we generally prohibit vehicles from parking on the street overnight which ensures our Public Works crew can remove leaves, snow, and other debris. Off-street parking also ensures that emergency response vehicles can travel safely, while also arriving at any potential incident in the timeliest manner. Additionally, vehicles in the roadway during hours of darkness limits visibility of drivers, decreases safety of pedestrians, and enables cover for criminal activity.

The holiday season can bring much joy to families but can also present unforeseen challenges. We are here to assist wherever we can and are always open to helping those in need. #### November at our Door Step! By: Tom Schroeder, Director Public Works

A seasonal change is upon us as November is at our doorstep, knocking softly for now. We know full well that we are likely to see all manner of weather over the coming weeks, so use the good days that are available and take care of those outdoor things requiring your attention.

As the garden and yard materials are gathered from every nook and cranny from your great outdoors, please be mindful to separate like materials on to the terrace and not in the street. This is a very simple act to perform, and it is a necessary action to avoid polluting our natural resources...Lake Mendota. We will make, at minimum, one full circuit of yard waste collection every week (excluding Thanksgiving week) until weather conditions prevents our ability to do so. Realize too, that placing materials for collection near or around obstacles like mailboxes; utility poles; street signs; trees and vehicles and equipment will delay or prevent collections. Your contractors and other service providers should be made aware of this. We stay on route and when the circuit is done, we start all over again.

Recently we were able to apply a newly learned maintenance procedure to 3 of our oldest hydrants; they now perform extremely well.

Our 2003 LTC 650 ODB leaf loader was taken out of service. It was determined that a fuel issue was the culprit. Long story short, we removed the fuel tank and cleaned it to our satisfaction, and we now have a well running ODB leaf loader once again.

The Public Works Department has been short a fulltime and part-time team members. We have provided offers of employment for both positions. The parttime position will be filled in early November. The full-time position is pending.

**Recent Responses:** In the past month, the MBFD has responded to several large-scale incidents in Dane County.

On October 5, 2022 the MBFD responded as part of a Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) request into the Village of McFarland for a working structure fire. The McFarland Fire Department encountered flames issuing through the roof of the Maple Tree Restaurant upon arrival and requested assistance from 14 different fire/EMS agencies. Thankfully all the occupants were able to exit the supper club safely and no one was injured. A cause has not yet been determined.



On the morning of Friday, October 21, 2022, the MBFD responded into the Village of Oregon as part of a multi-alarm MABAS response for a home explosion. Our crew arrived on scene and assisted with fire suppression and neighborhood evacuation. Nearly 20 agencies responded to the incident and thankfully nobody was injured. The cause is still under investigation.

#### Parks Key Fob Program

The program is a \$60 annual fee. Renewal applications will be distributed to residents in late December.
