Newsletter from the Department of Public Works - August 2023

The drought is not over, so please give your young trees and shrubs some love and water them a couple times per week. Even the older trees could use some help. For the most part grass will rebound.

As a department we pride ourselves on the level and frequency of our collection services. They are founded on taking care of the DIY resident, not for contractors. We will collect what a resident places on the terrace of their own efforts, but contractors are responsible for the debris they generate. Please think before placing materials, be sure that they are not co-mingled and that they are on the terrace and not in the street. We cover the entire village every week, less storms and Thanksgiving, so there is not the chance of killing grass. Also understand that we do not back track once we have been through the village with our equipment.

It took some time for us to finish the asphalt patching on Farwell from Lakewood to Summit. I'm sure too long for some. Hopefully the patches and pea gravel overlay will extend the life of the road many years. The contractor Scotts Construction will be using the Madison specifications for the overlay that should take place in early August. I am expecting a better product this year as the sweeping will take place on the same day as application.

Please have a discussion with your service providers that they can and should use your driveway if possible and if not, they should park to take up the smallest footprint practical, using one side of the road instead of both. Our roadways are fairly narrow, and the mindset of contractors is what's easy and not necessarily what's best for the conditions.





We will be challenging contractors and service providers regarding Permits to obstruct right of way. There will be a lengthy learning curve as educating will take time and effort. Keep in mind that the road and a portion of the terrace is right of way. The road should not be considered part of the project zone. Before the road and terrace are utilized as such you will need a permit.

We have a couple of stormwater pipes to work on. One is on Fisk and 2 others are on Kensington.

The Bridal Wreath is on our list of to do's.

Tree removal and trimming will continue most of the year.

There is plenty of summer left to enjoy all manner of outdoor fun and excitement, as well as, projects and just good 'ol hanging out or grilling out.

Fire Rescue Department By Kristopher Loy, Fire Chief




Response Information:

The Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department (MBFD) has responded to a total of 84 calls for service in 2023.

The MBFD's new ambulance has responded to 27 emergency medical calls

which resulted in 14 patients being transported to area hospitals since going into service March 1st, 2023. Our Fire and EMS crews have an average response time within the Village of 4 minutes (from the time we're notified to our arrival on scene).



Visit to Camp Ya-Gotta-Wanna:

The Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Department paid a visit to Camp Ya-Gotta-Wanna on July 20th, 2023. Our firefighters and EMTs talked to the kids about fire safety and showed them our equipment and apparatus. Following our safety presentation, the kids enjoyed a run through the best sprinkler in town.



Fest on the 4th:

The Maple Bluff Fire Rescue Association would like to extend their sincere appreciation for everyone's support on the 4th of July. The Fest on the 4th is their largest fund-raising event of the year. This year, they raised over \$2,000.00 to be used for educational opportunities for Fire/EMS Department staff.



Recent Notable Calls:

On July 6, 2023 our department responded to a grill on fire next to a home on Coleman Road in the Village. The grill's fuel source was a plumbed, direct line, into the house's natural gas and was fully engulfed upon arrival. Our crew was able to isolate the gas line and extinguish the fire within minutes of arrival. A faulty hose/adapter leaking natural gas was determined to be the cause of the fire. Thankfully nobody was injured during the incident. The grill was a total loss and damages are estimated to be approximately \$1,000.00.



On July 12, 2023, our department responded with an engine to a multi-alarm fire in the 4600 Block of Baxter Rd. in the Town of Cottage Grove. The home was fully engulfed upon arrival of the first fire apparatus. Our crew assisted with a safety officer and fire suppression for the incident. The home was a total loss with an estimated value of approximately \$350,000. During the fire incident, a person with fatal injuries not caused by the fire was located on scene. The Dane County Sheriff's Office is investigating and will issue a statement at the conclusion of their investigation.

Citizens' Public Safety Sub-Committee Formed

This spring, the Village of Maple Bluff Board of Trustees approved the creation of the Citizens' Public Safety Sub-Committee, which advises the police committee and other committees as appropriate about opportunities to make our village a safer place for all residents. If you have concerns, suggestions, or want to learn more about how to improve security and deter crime in our neighborhood, please attend one of our upcoming meetings. Meeting times and locations are published in the village update emails and newsletters.

Committee members talked to a Maple Bluff security expert Jeffrey Beckmann (owner of J&K Security Solutions) recently to discuss what village residents can do to make sure their homes are secure and not an attractive target for property crime or theft. Mr. Beckmann shared the following tips and reminders:

- Install outdoor lighting, especially at points of entry like doors and garages. Many options can automate to a dusk to dawn, or you can opt for motion sensor triggered lights. Pro tip: warm white LED bulbs can save you money compared to the cooler options.
- Doorbell and point-of-entry cameras
- Deadbolts on doors
- Do not leave any valuables in sight in your home or car.
- If you go out of town, consider using timers on indoor lights at random intervals (not patterns) and be sure to have your mail held at the US Post Office.
- Signage about your security system
- Get to know your neighbors and watch out for each other!

We look forward to offering more helpful information and updates in the coming weeks, especially as school begins again.

Beach House, Dailey Cabin, and Gym Rentals

There is a growing trend with rentals at our facilities; the desire to have amplified noise/music. As a reminder, Village Ordinance 192.7.1 prohibits the use of amplified noise between the hours of 9:00pm - 7:00am in public parks. This information is also included on the rental form. Be courteous to your fellow neighbors and abide by this ordinance when renting our facilities. If you are a neighbor to the park and amplified noise has exceeded these times, please contact the Dane County Non-Emergency Number at 255-2345 which will gather important information and relay to the Maple Bluff Police Department to address the noise complaint.

The Beach House has been reserved on the following dates as of writing this newsletter article, August 5, 13, 31, September 3, 8, 9, 23, October 5 and 6.

Beach House Tennis Courts

No tennis or pickleball can be played on the courts before 7am and after 9pm. If people are waiting to play, try to limit your use to an hour to allow others to enjoy the courts. Please check the Village's calendar before playing to make sure they are available for open play and not reserved for exclusive use.





Beach House Staffed Hours

The Lifeguard staff will end summer employment mid-August as they head back to school. The Beach House will be locked once staff have ended employment and will be available via the key fob program. If you're planning on swimming or entering the water, know the signs of blue-green algae and if present keep yourself and your pets out of the water. Blue-green algae blooms occur throughout the summer in Lake Mendota. The water can appear green or blue and has a distinct smell. When in doubt, please exercise caution, stay out and keep your pets from entering the water. Public Health Madison-Dane County will continue to test the water quality for E.Coli until Labor Day weekend, but blue-green algae can appear within a few hours.
