BIOGRAPHY: DARREL D. 'AJ' FEUCHT



Colonel Darrel D. 'AJ' Feucht is a graduate of Columbus High School, Columbus, Wisconsin. He holds a Bachelor of Sciences degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in Agriculture and a Bachelor of Arts degree from Lakeland College in Accounting. He holds an advanced management and leadership certificate from the UW-Madison School of Business and a master's

degree in Management and Organizational Behavior from Silver Lake College. His military education includes the U.S. Army Engineer Officer Basic and Advanced Courses, Combined Arms and Services Staff School, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the Field Grade Pre-Command Course and Title 10 Dual Commanders Course.

Colonel Feucht was commissioned a second lieutenant, United States Army Corps of Engineers, through the Reserve Officer Training Corps program in 1985 and began his military career with numerous commands and staff assignments in the 86th Army Reserve Command and the 84th Division, U.S. Army Reserve. In August 1994, he transferred to the Wisconsin Army National Guard as assistant plans officer, 332nd Rear Area Operations Center. In subsequent years, he served in a succession of staff positions within the 64th Troop Command. He assumed command of the 64th Rear Operations Center (ROC) in June 2002. In September 2002, the 64th ROC deployed for a year of active duty in support of Operation Enduring Freedom II and Operation Iraqi Freedom I. He also was the deputy director of operations, XVIII (18th) Airborne Corps during that deployment. He commanded the 64th ROC until May 2004, when he was assigned as operations officer, and later as executive officer, of 64th Troop Command. He commanded the 64th Troop Command from August 2007 to September 2010. He assumed the position of J-4, Domestic Operations on the JF-HQ, Joint Staff in September 2010 until assuming the command of Wisconsin's first mission of its kind, the 82nd Agribusiness Development Team (ADT). He also served as the Strategic Plans Chief for Task Force Hydra, Camp Phoenix, Kabul, Afghanistan. The Wisconsin 82nd ADT completed a successful deployment to Asad Abad, Kunar Province and the Capitol Region in Kabul, Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom XIII. Colonel Feucht had the privilege of commanding soldiers and airmen over half of his successful career. He retired after a 30-year career in July 2013.

His military awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with four oak leaf clusters, the Army Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Army Achievement Medal with four oak leaf clusters, the Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, the National Defense Service Medal with bronze service star, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal with campaign star, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, the Army Reserve Components Overseas Training Ribbon, the NATO Medal, Combat Action Badge and the Eisenhower Trophy Unit Ribbon. He is a 2017 inductee to the Wisconsin Army National Guard Hall of Honor. He is a 2019 inductee to the University of Wisconsin - Madison Army ROTC Badger Battalion Hall of Fame.

Colonel Feucht is a retired civilian since April 2022. He worked for 35 years as manager of facilities and life safety for Nelnet, Inc. (fka Great Lakes Educational Loan Services, Inc.), Madison, Wisconsin. He is an adjunct professor at Lakeland University since 2014. He is an active member of VFW Post 7591 (house committee member and chaplain) in Madison, American Legion Post 501, Post (3rd vice commander and chaplain) in Madison, Commonwealth Masonic Lodge #325 (senior warden) in Madison and Monona United Methodist Church (certified lav minister) in Monona, Wisconsin. A member of International Conference of Police Chaplains (ICPC). He is active on his Harley Davidson, a Master Gardener, Badger Honor Flight volunteer and an Agrace Vets to Vets Program volunteer, novice woodworker and works on his 1966 Ford Mustang convertible during his free time. He lives in Monona, Wisconsin with his fiancé Elley, daughters Satine and Nevaeh, twin sons, Mitchell and Andrew.

Department of Public Works By Tom Schroeder, Director of Public Works

It has turned out to be one of those years with precipitation... specifically rainfall. Rain with wind, rain without wind, some rain that rivals the monsoon of tropical regions...and nearly all the events had plenty of lightning and thunder. From the 1st of June to the 19th of July Madison has had 16.5" of rain. The rains of the weekend of July 13-14 were equal to the entire average for the month. The lake levels have been managed by the County and State to stay under 852' on Mendota despite the constant thunderstorms tracking across south central Wisconsin. Our storm system worked quite well having to deal with a storm that provided 4-7" of rain in a 90-minute period Sunday the 14th. The storm system is built to handle a 5-10-year storm event...that is 2.5"- 4.2" rain in a 24-hour period. We experienced all of that in an hour and a half. Once the rain stopped the system caught up very well. The lake level is so high that the storm system is already pre-loaded, this will slow the outfall and rain will go with the elevation and lay of the land. Landscaping with a defensive posture of protecting one's home is a reasonable approach. When flash flooding takes place storm systems are over matched, pipes in the ground are full. Surface flow will take place with defensive landscaping or not. If you live in an area

with dramatic elevation change and you are at the lower end...landscaping could be a consideration. If you have any doors at ground level be sure that rainwater is directed away from your home. I am aware that some construction has taken place over decades that are not built with a 5- or 10-year storm even in mind...let alone a 100-year storm event.

With the recent thunderstorms taking place it should be plain to see the difference between placing yard debris on the terrace or onto the street. PLEASE place all materials on the terrace for collection.

Another observation with our experiences with storms this year is that nearly every tree failure had some level of previous existing conditions. The tree was destined to fail with a little nudge from nature. Please consider having a professional arborist assess your trees great and small to minimize the chances for disaster.

The Department of Public Works will be welcoming Andrew Boersma back to the DPW team. We are pleased to have him return to the fold. There is no place like Maple Bluff!!!



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
