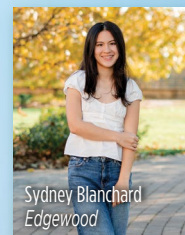
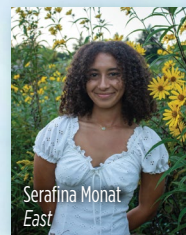
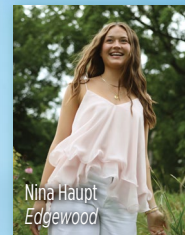

Village Board President Message

As summer approaches, the Village continues to stay active on a number of important projects, community initiatives, and long-term planning efforts that will help shape Maple Bluff's future.

One of the more significant discussions this past month centered around the Village's Gateway Plan. Thank you to all our residents and neighbors who joined Village Trustees, planners, and staff to review and discuss the Plan and its future direction. The Gateway Plan is a long-standing document intended to guide our thinking and future implementation efforts along the North Sherman Avenue corridor and the surrounding commercial area. The Plan remains relevant today and continues to be an important component of our 2026 Strategic Plan. During the discussion, we heard valuable input regarding traffic, bike use, streetscape enhancements, and neighborhood character. Thank you to Trustee Jim Schuler for helping restart and advance this important community conversation.

Closely tied to that discussion, our Madison neighbors also invited Village residents to participate in the review of three proposals for an approximately 15-acre area of conservation and recreational space planned north of the railroad tracks on the east side of North Sherman Avenue. The proposals include public green space for community use, wetland habitat and natural areas for wildlife, and more intensive recreational uses such as basketball courts.

We appreciate the invitation and the opportunity to remain engaged on projects immediately adjacent to our community.

As we continue planning for the future of the Village, we are also navigating several important staff transitions. Please join me in congratulating and thanking Sergeant Jay Sugden for his 30-year commitment to keeping our community safe and secure. Jay has been an invaluable part of the Village team and community, and he will be greatly missed.

Similarly, Tom Schroeder, our Director of Public Works, has announced his retirement and plans to conclude his service in January 2027. Like Jay, Tom's dedication and commitment to the Village have been exceptional. While these transitions are significant, I am thankful we have outstanding team members in place who will help ensure continuity and a smooth transition moving forward.

With summer now arriving, I look forward to celebrating the season with all of you at Bocce Night, the Village-Wide Graduation Party, and our Monday night concert series. Thank you to Parks and Recreation Director Mark Benishek, Trustee Lilly Bickers, and all of our staff and volunteers who work so hard behind the scenes to make our summer programming possible.



Welcoming New Leadership, Preparing for the Future

As we move into the summer season, there continues to be significant activity across the Village, both operationally and strategically. Staff remain focused on maintaining high-quality services while also continuing long-term planning efforts intended to position Maple Bluff well into the future.

On the Fire/EMS side, I am excited to formally announce the appointment of Ethan Nelson as the Village's next Fire Chief and EMS Director. Ethan has served as one of our Assistant Chiefs for the past two years and has consistently demonstrated himself to be a capable, thoughtful, and motivated leader. Just as importantly, his character and leadership approach strongly align with the values and culture of our team. I believe Ethan brings significant potential for continued growth and will have a positive long-term impact on the Department and community.



One of Ethan's first major leadership opportunities will be helping shape the Department's future leadership team. We are actively recruiting for two Assistant Fire Chief positions and I look forward to updating the community on that progress in the coming months.

Another major milestone reached this past month was formal approval of the Village's Strategic Plan by the Village Board. The plan, including the adopted goals and objectives associated with each Strategic Priority, is now available on the Village website for residents interested in reviewing it in full. The next phase of this work now begins in earnest. Staff are actively working to move implementation forward, and I am currently developing a framework to provide the Village Board with regular progress updates while departments begin executing the objectives themselves. Strategic planning is ultimately only valuable if it results in thoughtful action, measurable progress, and long-term organizational discipline. It is time to get to work.

Within the Police Department, we are also continuing to navigate an important period of transition and development. I am pleased to share that we expect to welcome two new full-time police officers to the Department in June, which will return us to full staffing. I look forward to introducing them to the community next month. At the same time, our recent leadership transition has gone very well. Lieutenant Kyle Knoeck and Sergeant Zach Stec have both stepped into their new roles with professionalism, energy, and strong initiative. I remain very optimistic about the future leadership of the Department and our continued ability to provide high-quality service to the community for many years to come.

I also want to again thank Sergeant Jay Sugden for his more than 30 years of dedicated service to the Village as he enters retirement. Jay's professionalism, institutional knowledge, and steady leadership have had a lasting impact on the organization and community alike. We were fortunate to have the opportunity to transition leadership responsibilities thoughtfully prior to his retirement, and we wish him and his family the very best moving forward.

As part of our continued regional coordination efforts, I recently participated in a walkthrough of the Huxley Yards apartment development alongside representatives from the Madison Police Department and onsite management staff. The property management team was professional, engaged, and appears committed to being a strong partner moving forward. At the same time, even during the early stages of occupancy, there are already indicators of some of the operational and quality-of-life challenges commonly associated with large-scale multifamily developments. None of these observations should be viewed as unexpected or inherently problematic, but they do reinforce the importance of proactive management, early intervention, and strong partnerships between property management, law enforcement, and the surrounding community.

More broadly, the continued development occurring throughout the Northside corridor will likely have long-term implications for traffic patterns, public safety demands, infrastructure, parks, businesses, and regional service coordination. Maple Bluff remains closely interconnected with the surrounding area, and I believe it is important that we continue approaching these developments thoughtfully, objectively, and proactively. One of the strongest observations from the walkthrough

was the increasing operational complexity being managed by surrounding agencies, particularly the Madison Police Department, as density and activity levels continue to rise. Over time, these trends will likely continue influencing mutual aid demands, officer workload, and the resiliency expected of smaller departments operating adjacent to a growing urban environment. These realities reinforce the importance of maintaining strong regional relationships, continuing proactive policing and engagement strategies, supporting officer wellness and readiness, and planning carefully for the future. We continue to believe it is wiser to proactively prevent and mitigate issues early through preparedness, engagement, and coordination rather than simply responding after problems become more significant.

As summer activity ramps up across the Village, I also want to recognize the significant amount of work currently underway by our Municipal Services, Recreation, and administrative teams in preparation for the busy season ahead. Mark Benishek and Natalie Scheer, in particular, have been working extremely hard coordinating recreation programming, seasonal operations, facilities, logistics, and countless behind-the-scenes details that help make summer in Maple Bluff successful. We are fortunate to have both of them on our team as we move into one of the busiest times of the year.

Finally, as always, there continues to be a significant amount of activity occurring across all Village departments that is simply difficult to fully capture within a single newsletter article. From recreation programming and public works projects to strategic planning initiatives, regional coordination, staffing transitions, and operational improvements, it is a busy and productive time for the Village. Staff across all departments are working hard to ensure Maple Bluff remains the independent, responsive, and distinguished community it has always been. I encourage residents to remain engaged, continue following Village communications, and periodically review updates posted to the Village website. Our team remains committed to meeting and exceeding the expectations of the community we serve, and I continue to be grateful for the professionalism, dedication, and care demonstrated daily by Village staff.

To the Residents of the Village of Maple Bluff,

There are moments in life that are far more difficult than we ever expect them to be, and for me, writing this letter is one of those moments.

On June 3, 2026, I will officially retire from the Maple Bluff Police Department after 31 years with the department. While retirement is supposed to be a time of celebration and new beginnings, the truth is that leaving Maple Bluff is incredibly emotional for me. This village has been woven into the fabric of my life for so long that it is hard to imagine not putting on the uniform and continuing to serve the people who have meant so much to me.

Maple Bluff was never simply the place where I worked. It became part of who I am. Long before I wore a badge, I knew this community through my father's barber shop at the North Gate Shopping Center. As a young man, I remember watching residents walk through the doors, talking with one another like family, looking out for each other, and taking pride in this special village. Even back then, there was something different about Maple Bluff. There was a sense of belonging here that stayed with me. I remember hoping that maybe someday I could become part of something like this.

When I was hired as a police intern in 1994, I had no idea how much this community would shape my life. I could never have imagined the friendships I would build, the memories I would carry, or the incredible honor it would be to serve generations of families in this village.

Over the years, I watched children grow up and later introduced me to their own children. I stood beside families during some of the happiest moments of their lives and, at times, some of the hardest. I have shared laughs on front porches, quiet conversations during difficult nights, handshakes, tears, hugs, and countless moments that never made headlines but meant everything to me personally.

Some of the memories I will treasure most are the simple ones – waving to kids during patrol, hearing residents call out my name as I drove through the neighborhood, helping someone who simply needed another person to listen, or seeing the joy on a child's face during Shop with a Cop. Those moments reminded me, over and over again, why this profession mattered and why Maple Bluff was so special.

This career gave me more than a profession. It helped shape me as a husband, a father, a friend, and a leader. But serving this community also came with sacrifices, especially for my family. For many years, particularly

working third shift, there were missed holidays, interrupted family dinners, sleepless nights, and moments my wife Coreenia and our children carried without complaint so I could answer the call to serve others. They sacrificed more than most people will ever know. There is no way to fully express how grateful I am for their patience, love, and unwavering support throughout this journey. I could not have done this without them.

I also cannot say enough about the men and women I had the privilege to work beside at the Maple Bluff Police Department. Through long nights, heartbreaking calls, laughter in the squad room, moments of uncertainty, and challenges that tested all of us, we became more than coworkers, we became family. Together, we experienced extraordinary times, including the COVID pandemic, civil unrest, and moments that weighed heavily on every law enforcement officer. Through it all, I remained proud to wear this badge and proud to serve this community.

What has always set Maple Bluff apart is its people. The trust you placed in me over these many years is something I never took lightly. Allowing me into your homes, your lives, and your most vulnerable moments was an honor that humbled me every single day. I always tried my best to serve with compassion, honesty, dignity, and respect because this community deserved nothing less.

As I prepare to turn in my badge for the final time, I do so with a full heart. I leave with gratitude that words cannot fully capture, memories I will cherish forever, and emotions that are difficult to describe. Maple Bluff has given me friendships, purpose, support, and a lifetime of moments I will carry with me always. Although my role here is changing, a part of me will always belong to this village.

Thank you for trusting me.
Thank you for supporting me.
Thank you for allowing me the incredible privilege of serving you and your families for nearly three decades.

Maple Bluff Fire Rescue

Response Information

During April and May, our crews maintained an average response time of 4 minutes and 10 seconds, reflecting consistent readiness across both fire and EMS calls. So far this year, we've responded to 67 incidents, covering a wide range of emergencies.

Personnel

We're excited to welcome several new faces into the department. Beginning in June, three new interns will join us, each bringing a different level of experience and certification, but all sharing a strong interest in our well established 2-year Internship program. We will also be adding one new paid-on-call firefighter, giving us additional depth as we move into our busiest months. Bringing in new people is always energizing, and we're looking forward to getting them oriented and integrated into the team.

Training

Our training efforts this spring have covered a mix of fireground and EMS topics. Fire personnel spent time reviewing Ventilation, Fire Behavior, and Flow paths, reinforcing an understanding of how modern fires move and how we can make safer tactical decisions. On the EMS side, crews are trained on managing allergic reactions and asthma emergencies, which are more common as the weather warms up.

We are also preparing for a joint Active Shooter Incident Management (ASIM) session with the Maple Bluff Police Department on May 28th. This tabletop training will help strengthen coordination between our agencies and ensure we're aligned in how we handle complex, high-risk incidents.

Public Outreach

We're gearing up for a full and active community season. Planning is underway for Concerts in the Park, Fest on the Fourth, and several other summer events where our department will be present and engaged. These gatherings give residents a chance to meet our firefighters, see our equipment up close, and learn more about the services we provide. We appreciate the continued support from the community and look forward to another safe, busy, and enjoyable summer here in Maple Bluff.

Department of Public Works

The seasonal shift from spring to summer is upon us. It has been a tale of two springs, an active stormy rainy spring and our current dry spring. I would think all of us somehow was impacted with the heavy weather...hail. Many may have been surprised how much their policies did or didn't cover and or how much their deductible ballooned. Reality can be hard to deal with on this rock that spins at 1040 miles per hour and is hurtling around the sun at 67,000 mph. Thank goodness for gravity. Having mentioned about miles per hour, the beach area is 15 mph until November, thank you in advance.

We have lots taking place this spring.

Our usual clean up for collections. Please segregate materials unlike in separate groupings. Leaf collection is over. If you have leaves for collection, please bag them. The equipment is out of service pending the retro fitting of the old garbage truck into a leaf hauler.

New decking for the beach pier took several days to modify the attachment of the benches and lifeguard chairs. Fixed an aging yard hydrant at the marina; it needs loving care when used please.

A landscaping project is underway in Johnson Park along the walkway of Bayside and Old Shore. We will re-new the path with concrete and place fresh shrubs and landscaping alongside.

There is new construction along with a teardown and rebuilding taking place.

There will be a chip seal applied on Farwell from the 6-700 block to the marina. This is a different application that we tried last year on N. Sherman that worked well.

Having tendered my intent to retire from my position of Director of Public Works at the beginning of 2027; I have 6 months to land this plane...nice and easy!
